Offline Activities

In the Kitchen

Got plums? They are great this time of year. Try this interesting plum and parmesan salad!

- 2 Tbsp. sherry or red wine vinegar
- 1 Tbsp. honey
- ½ tsp. black pepper
- 6 ripe plums, some sliced, some in wedges (black, red and or green plums will work, or a combination)
- ¼ cup shaved Parmesan or Pecorino cheese, plus more for serving
- 2 Tbsp. extra virgin olive oil
- Sea salt (flakey is best, but regular ok too)

Stir vinegar, honey pepper together. Add plums and mix

Add ¼ cup of the cheese and toss together with plums and the vinegar honey mixture Transfer to bowl and drizzle with olive oil

Add a bit more cheese and the salt, and add a bit more pepper if desired

Indoor Gardening

How about creating an indoor cactus garden? Most grocery stores, and even CVS and Rite Aid, sell small cactus plants that are easy to use in making a small cactus garden. Cactus are easy to grow inside and don't take much time or attention. Besides a few plants, you will need a bowl or vase in which to plant them (about 5 inches deep works well), some pebbles, charcoal or rocks for the bottom layer, some soil that drains well (there is cactus soil available at nurseries if you are worried about drainage), a good spot with lot of light. Then you just have to remember not to water the plants too much—maybe just once a month!

Christmas in July?

Take out those unused holiday cards and write a note to friends you would normally send holiday cards to in December. Nobody seems to get real mail any more, but it's really fun to get an unexpected handwritten note from a friend. No holiday cards left over? Any sort of note card will do, as will just a plain sheet of paper. It's the thought that counts!

Red, White and Blue Dessert

- 1. Place a mix of raspberries, blueberries, blackberries and strawberries in a glass bowl (or any combination, just so some red and some blue)

In the Kitchen

An Easy Fruit Crisp

Ingredients

1 lb. fresh fruit—peaches, plums, strawberries, blueberries, blackberries and apples all work—and yes you can mix them. Just be sure to cut the larger fruit into about ½ inch pieces.

1/4 cup butter, softened and cut into small pieces1/2 cup oats1/4 cup flour1/3 cup brown sugar1 tsp cinnamon

Instructions

- Preheat oven to 350
- Mix oats, flour, brown sugar, and cinnamon together in medium bowl
- Use your hands or a fork and mix in the butter, making sure there is little to no dry flour remaining at the bottom of the bowl
- Either split the fruit into four small ramekins, or place in 8 x 8 metal or ceramic pie/cake pan
- Evenly sprinkle the crumble mixture on top, making sure there are no large gaps
- Heat for 45 minutes if using the small ramekins. If using one large dish start checking at 35 minutes. Crumble topping should be golden brown and should have spread slightly.
- Let cool. Serve as is or with ice cream

In the Kitchen

Pasta Con Ceci

This one is really easy! Just smash garlic cloves and open some cans/boxes.

<u>Ingredients</u>

- 4 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil, plus more for drizzling
- 3 cloves garlic, peeled and smashed
- 3 tablespoons good tomato paste
- 1 teaspoon kosher or sea salt, or more to taste
- $1^{1}/_{2}$ cups cooked chickpeas (or one 15-ounce can, drained and rinsed)
- ¹/₂ cup uncooked ditalini pasta (or another small shape pasta, like macaroni)
- 2 cups boiling water

Crushed red pepper flakes, for serving

Steps

Heat olive oil in a large heavy-bottomed pot until it shimmers

Add garlic and cook, stirring, until it becomes lightly browned and fragrant

Stir in tomato paste and salt and heat through for 30 seconds

Add chickpeas, pasta and boiling water

Stir to scrape up any browned bits on the pan bottom

Lower the heat and simmer until the pasta is cooked and most of the liquid absorbed—about 15-20 minutes

Taste and adjust seasoning, serve and top with crushed red pepper flakes and a bit of drizzled olive oil

In the Kitchen

Basic Mason Jar Ice Cream

Ingredients

- 1 cup heavy cream
- 1 ½ tablespoons granulated sugar
- 1 ½ teaspoons vanilla extract
- A pinch of salt
- A 16 oz Mason jar, of course. Yield: About three servings.

Steps

- 1. Pour the cream, sugar, vanilla and salt into the jar, and screw on the lid tightly.
- 2. Shake vigorously, until the cream thickens and almost doubles in size, which should take about five minutes. (Good upper body exercise, too!) You'll know you're done when the mixture doubles in volume and is about the consistency of brownie batter.
- 3. Freeze for at least 3 hours. Then eat. You're welcome.

Berry Ice Cream. If you want the flavor mixed in, blend ½ cup of fresh berries and add it to the mixture before you freeze it. (You can also cheat: a tablespoon of jam will work.) If you prefer chunks, cut up the berries. Voilà.

Cooking

Here an old, reliable, and delicious recipe for roasting a chicken.

1 3 ½ pound whole chicken

2½ teaspoon kosher salt (or sea salt)

2 teaspoons black pepper

Small bunch of mixed fresh herbs such as rosemary, thyme and sage.

Season the chicken inside and out with salt and pepper and refrigerate, uncovered, for at least an hour, or overnight.

Heat the oven to 450 degrees. Place chicken breast-side up in a roasting pan or large ovenproof skillet. Stuff cavity with fresh herbs. (Or you can sprinkle dry herbs inside if you don't have fresh ones.)

Roast 50 minutes, then baste chicken with pan juices. Continue roasting until the chicken's juices run clear when skin is pierced with a knife, 5 or 10 minutes longer. Let stand 10 minutes before carving.

Comfort Food!

SARDINES ON TOAST

This recipe can be easily varied by adding tomatoes, or changing the sauce with which the sardines are tinned. Sardines can be heated or served cold.

Ingredients

1 tin sardines—either plain or in tomato sauce 1 tablespoon mayo Juice of ½ lemon (optional) Parsley or lettuce strips (optional) Minced onion (optional) Two slices of toast

Directions

Mash up the sardines (mostly drained if using plain sardines in oil, without draining if using sardines in tomato sauce). Sardines can be heated before you mash them up, or mashed up straight from the can.

Mix in mayo and juice of the lemon. Mix in minced onion (cooked or raw). Top toast with sardine mixture and top with parsley or lettuce strips.

Note: alternatively, don't mash up the sardines, but serve whole on toast covered with mayo and rings of raw or cooked onion and parsley or lettuce.

Comfort Food!

EASY SPAGHETTI WITH TUNA

Flavorful and a bit different—about 10 minutes cooking time

Ingredients

- 1/2 package spaghetti (or bucatini)—cooked about 3 minutes less than package directions
- Good olive oil, and lots of it
- 1 pint cherry or grape tomatoes of whatever colors are at hand, halved
- 2 or 3 good sized cloves garlic, minced
- 1 can tuna packed in olive oil, not drained, opened, (packed in water ok, but not as good)
- A couple of generous handfuls of spinach leaves, stems pulled off
- Juice of 1/2 lemon,
- Sea or kosher salt and pepper to taste
- A good Parmesan or Romano cheese (Optional—use sparingly)

Directions

Boil water for the pasta and begin to cook it.

Heat skillet with generous portion of olive oil—don't skimp. Sauté tomatoes and then add garlic when the tomatoes start to soften. Add the tuna with oil (or if using tuna in water—drain most of the water first). Stir and let simmer a few minutes

When the pasta is ready (remember cook about 3 minutes less than package directions), use tongs to add it to the skillet, along with about 2 ladles of the pasta water. Add lemon juice and spinach leaves. Simmer a bit more and add salt and pepper to taste.

Cooking

Pay attention to what you are eating! Try cooking up some comfort food that is also good for you, or try out something more challenging that you've been meaning to test out—maybe a souffle?

Depending on the recipe, you can make a batch just for now, or make more and freeze some for later!

Here are three easy recipes:

Italian Chicken: Chicken thighs (two -four), 1 can stewed tomatoes, some oregano or thyme, or Italian seasoning, salt and pepper. Place chicken in an oven proof dish, cover with tomatoes and seasoning, Bake uncovered at 350 until done (40 to 60 minutes depending on your oven). Serve as is, or with rice or pasta.

Pasta primavera: Spaghetti or fettucine, or really any kind of pasta. Make according to box directions. We add a bit of olive oil and top with cooked vegetables of your choice—cooked fresh or leftovers, e.g., tomatoes, spinach, peas, broccoli, bell peppers, etc.

Easy sandwich on toast: Spark up any sandwich (melted cheese, avocado, egg or tuna salad) by toasting the bread and adding tomato slices, cooked bacon and lettuce or a red cabbage leaf.

Do it once with "obvious" choices, then do again and try for a more esoteric or maybe funny vocabulary choice! Play it alone, or with a friend.

Writing, Painting, Drawing, Doodling

Poetry: Poetry can be helpful to read in difficult times, but also both challenging and fun to write anytime. How about trying to write some Haiku, or maybe a limerick, if lengthy serious poetry is not your thing. Haiku is just three lines 5, 7 and 5 syllables respectively, evoking images or objects, and frequently with a twist or surprise. No rhyming! Haikus can be serious or funny. Here are two examples:

Today reminds me	First autumn morning
I need you so much closer	the mirror I stare into
Than six feet apart	shows my father's face.

Or how about a limerick? Limericks are five-line poems, or a series of verses, with a rhyme scheme of AABBA. The meter is lilting with the first, second and fifth lines having 8-9 syllables, and the third and fourth having 5-6 syllables. Limericks have a reputation of being off-color, but they don't have to be! For example:

I used to get out every day

Now staying at home is my way

Sheltering in place

Putting on a good face

But wishing to be out on the Bay

Drawing and Painting: Bring out your inner artist. Here's an activity suggested by the Fine Arts Museums of SF: Take a tour of your home, studying the views from each of your windows. With each view, quietly consider: what do you notice, what shapes do you see, and how do these shapes layer and intersect? Select the window that appeals most to you. Using pencil and paper, create a contour drawing—a drawing consisting only of outlines. When creating your drawing, give your eye time to study the shapes that you see, then investigate how the shapes layer upon one another. Experiment with different thicknesses of line, as Diebenkorn did. The museums want to showcase your creativity! Send a photo of your drawing to digitalmarketing@famsf.org. Not comfortable with representational art drawing? Try doodling and filling in your doodles with colored ink or pencil.

Journaling: A useful way to keep track of feelings or how you are spending your day. Who knows, it might turn into a novel someday! You don't have to do it every day, but try it at least once a week on the same day and more or less the same time. You'll enjoy looking back at it at some point in the future.
