

January 26, 2021

Dear Marin Villages members and volunteers,

Are we or aren't we supposed to stay at home? Can we or can't we get a vaccination? Why is everything so crazy? You are definitely not alone if you are confused and frustrated! This email is longer than usual because there is lots going on. We may not be able to answer all your questions (especially not #3), but here is what we know as of this morning. This email is a bit longer than usual because there really is a lot to understand.

There are three pieces of good news on the COVID front:

- 1. California's ICU capacity has improved, and cases are declining.
- 2. ICU capacity has improved enough that the state has lifted the "stay at home" order, which paves the way for, among other things, restaurants to open again for outdoor dining and for gatherings to resume with non-family members (those in your bubble)—though timing will vary from county to county on lifting of restrictions. Marin issued a <u>press release</u> yesterday indicating we would revert to Tier 1 purple status and lists what activities are now authorized.

3. Those of us who have reached 75 can now schedule vaccinations!!

On the vaccination front, last week Dr. Matt Willis, Marin's public health officer, told us that he believes residents of Marin who are 75 and older all will be vaccinated against COVID within a month or month-and-a-half. This update gives key points to know about the vaccination process. Of course, no surprise, it's still a bit complicated.

Key points about vaccination scheduling:

- Vaccination focus in Marin is now on those 75 and older. Last week Dr. Willis spoke to Marin Villages and announced the big news that Kaiser, Sutter, MarinHealth Medical Network, and Marin County Public Health have all agreed to focus on vaccinating those of us 75 and older.
- The County expects this focus on age will speed up the vaccination process for Marin's most vulnerable residents. With age as the only requirement, the County expects the vaccination process will be much faster and easier to administer. After the 75 and older group is vaccinated, they will move to 65 and older and then younger groups while at the same time weaving in others by occupation etc. Anyone who already has a vaccination appointment but doesn't fit in the 75-and-older category, can still keep that appointment. They aren't planning to reschedule anyone who already has an appointment.
- The appointment scheduling process can be frustrating, though it's getting better. Persistence is the word of the day because the scheduling process can still be frustrating, especially because information on websites and on recorded messages when you call in aren't always up-to-date. Kaiser, Sutter, MarinHealth Medical Network and also the Marin Community Clinics are now starting to reach out to schedule vaccinations for their clients who are 75 and older. You can also schedule vaccination appointments with them by calling them (unfortunately, often a long wait) or through their online systems, though the process will vary among providers. If you are trying to book an appointment yourself, remember availability of appointments is tied to availability of vaccines, so if at first you don't succeed, try, try again—and again!
- Amount of vaccine is still limited. Availability of vaccines is tied to an allocation process that the healthcare providers don't fully control. Right now, the supplies of vaccine are still very limited, so it won't necessarily be possible to get an immediate appointment. But the federal government is now focused on getting more vaccine produced and distributed more effectively.
- Best to use your own healthcare provider. If you receive care through Kaiser, Sutter, MarinHealth Medical Network, or the Marin Community Clinics, it is best if you schedule with the one you

regularly go to for care if you can, because they all receive allocations of the vaccine based on the number of individuals they regularly serve. But, if you have trouble scheduling with your own provider, you can schedule with any of them even if they aren't your regular healthcare provider. If you don't receive care through Kaiser, Sutter, MarinHealth or Marin Community Clinics (or another major provider nearby such as UCSF or CPMC), Marin Public Health will help arrange your vaccination.

- Safeway, CVS, and Walgreens. In Marin right now, Safeway, CVS, and Walgreens are assisting with vaccinations of healthcare workers and residents in assisted living and long-term care facilities in our county. They are not yet providing vaccinations in their stores or to the general public.
- Tracking. The County is also <u>tracking the numbers of vaccinations</u>
 of <u>Marin residents</u> and will post a report on the Marin HHS website
 so we know how many residents have received vaccinations. The
 more who get vaccinated, the sooner we can "get back to normal."
- Form to indicate interest in notification regarding eligibility for vaccination. The County has also established an online system for people to sign up for notification of timing of vaccination availability as the eligibility age limits change. You can access the form here.
- If you can't sign up online because you don't use or have access to the internet. Marin Public Health is aware that not everyone is able or adept enough to use the internet to do online scheduling. They, along with the major health care providers, are developing a process for contacting these individuals by phone.
- If physical limitations prevent you from leaving your home. The County has mobile vaccination units and can arrange for home visits to provide the shots if a person is not able to leave home due to physical limitations. Marin Villages members who no longer drive may request a ride on our dashboard, subject to driver availability.
- **Veterans have an additional option.** U.S. veterans who are patients or receive services at Ft. Miley can make arrangements to receive the vaccination through the SF Veterans Administration. They have vaccine clinics every Saturday in SF, serving 75+.
- Masks, social distancing, etc. are STILL IMPORTANT. Face
 coverings, social distancing, avoidance of indoor gatherings,
 limiting trips to "essential outings" and hand-washing rules still
 apply even for those vaccinated. These rules will be necessary for
 some time.
- Scam Alert. Vaccinations are free. You can't be put on a waiting list, for money or otherwise. No one from Medicare will call you about the vaccine. You don't need to provide your Social Security number or credit card number or bank account information in connection with setting up a vaccination.
