COVID UPDATE

We've all heard the term Long COVID, but what does it mean and who gets it and why? These are questions that are still being answered by doctors and scientists and public health officials, but Dr. Matt Willis, Marin County's public health officer, offers some new evidence from England that helps us understand a bit more about who appears to be more at risk for Long COVID. The good news: vaccination and milder cases (not requiring hospitalization) are two of the likely forces for avoiding Long COVID. This speaks well to our experience in Marin County, where vaccination rates have kept hospitalization rates low. 

A Registry of My Passage upon the Earth, Daniel Mason

I'm usually not drawn to short stories, but two of Daniel Mason's three novels have remained favorites for many years, so I gave this book a try. And I'm so glad I did! Mason's writing is lyrical and thoroughly draws you into the time periods and settings (all the stories are historical, some based on real people). He experiments with different writing styles to suit each story, and with one exception, it works seamlessly. Mason is a psychiatrist at Stanford, so is able to convincingly describe characters' inner worlds and motivations. *The Guardian* describes it thus: "The grand pleasures of fiction are all here: rich, cushioning detail; vivid characters delivering decisive action; and a sense of escape into a larger world." And please do read two other novels by him: *The Piano Tuner* and *The Winter Soldier*. Three books in the space of one review! *Danielle, Marin Villages staff*

Operation Mincemeat, Netflix

Operation Mincemeat was a successful British deception operation of the Second World War to disguise the 1943 Allied invasion of Sicily. This 2021 British film, now showing on Netflix, deftly delves into the details of bringing the plan to fruition (it involved using a decoy corpse and false documents) while never bogging down. At a time without the modern technology and communications methods we are so used to, a group planning in Britain manages to plant a corpse in Spain whose information makes it to the top of the German hierarchy. But will the Nazis believe what the papers say? Colin Firth and Matthew Macfadyen (two former Mr. Darcys from *Pride & Prejudice*) have a terrific chemistry that draws you into the tension and intelligence and chance behind this now-legendary operation.
