A very happy birthday to our August nonagenarians



New Mental Health Crisis dialing code

988 is the new universal three-digit dialing code for suicide prevention and mental health crises. SAMHSA (the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services) will administer the new 988 Suicide and Crisis Lifeline, replacing the current toll-free National Suicide Prevention Lifeline's 1-800-273-TALK (1-800-273-8255). Calling 988 will direct the caller to representatives specifically trained in the management of suicide risk and other mental health crises.

COVID UPDATE

As if COVID news weren't sometimes concerning enough, now you are probably hearing conflicting reports about Monkeypox, some of which might sound quite alarming. 

The Dictionary of Lost Words, Pip Williams

Young Esme spends her days in the Scriptorium—the room where the Oxford English Dictionary is being created—with her father, one of the lexicographers collecting and sorting the words to be included. As she grows and takes on responsibilities with the dictionary, she begins to notice that the words being chosen reflect the world as seen by men. She starts writing down words she hears in the market, in the kitchen, and in other places where women do much of the work, exposing her to a whole new vocabulary that has never been recorded. The story weaves fictional Esme and her father into the real story of the OED's creation, as well as providing a window onto life in Oxford in the late 1800s and early 1900s. If you love words, how they are used, and where they come from, you will get lost in this story and the world it inhabits. I didn't want it to end. Danielle, Marin Villages staff

The Great American Recipe, PBS




