COVID UPDATE

Marin County Public Health Officer Dr. Matt Willis speaks in the video below about the current triple threat of viruses in Marin this fall: COVID, the flu, and RSV (explained further in this video and in this article: <u>https://www.vox.com/policy-and-politics/2022/10/27/23421344/covid-19-flu-rsv-symptoms-vaccines-2022</u>). Fortunately, right now there is not a surge in COVID cases in Marin, but a new strain has been seen in other countries and they are not sure what to expect when it inevitably reaches us here. Regarding the flu, a rise in cases is happening, but so far the strains are consistent with the strains in the flu vaccine, so get that vaccine! And of course the COVID booster, too. They are developing a vaccine for RSV, but it won't likely be available until next year. <u>https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=mxuYmHX-Z7M&t=18s</u>

In case this helps in deciding whether or not to get the new bivalent COVID booster, the Public Health Department released the following statistics about COVID in Marin County.

"COVID-19 is still a leading cause of preventable death in our community. To better understand factors contributing to mortality, Marin County Public Health analyzed all deaths in the past 6 months. Here's what we found:

- For the past six months, COVID deaths have been about evenly split between residents of longterm care facilities and people living in the community. This is a shift from the prior pattern, where two thirds of deaths were among facility residents.
- Among residents living in the community who died from COVID, 35 percent were not fully vaccinated, and the average age of death was 10 years younger than that of facility residents (77 versus 87 years, respectively.)

This means that deaths among unvaccinated older adults who are infected in the community are a major contributor to ongoing and preventable COVID-19 mortality in Marin County.

Preliminary data from Marin County show the updated booster formulation, first available September 1, is effectively protecting our residents. Of those over age 65 who are eligible, 45 percent have received the updated booster. There have been 22 hospitalizations in this age group over the same period—**none** of those hospitalized had received the updated booster. This means the hospitalization rate for those who have received the updated booster is **zero** in Marin, so far."

Shrines of Gaiety, Kate Atkinson


In 1926 London a rollicking nightlife is centered in the clubs of Soho, at the heart of which sits Nellie Coker. Ambitious, ruthless, and focused on advancing her six children in society, Nellie and her empire face threats from without and within. Kate Atkinson wrote *Life After Life*, a wonderfully intricate novel of the same life lived many different ways, and imbues this novel with a similar complexity and multitude of characters, most of whose intentions are not clear until the end. Nellie Coker is based on a real person and the details of London's between-wars lifestyle are colorful and fascinating. I can't say I loved every character that passed through these pages, but I also couldn't put the book down and feel like I learned about a historical era of which I knew very little. *Danielle, Marin Villages staff*




The Mysterious Benedict Society, Disney+
