As exciting as the anticipation of spring can be, the timing is inexorably tied in with tax-preparation time. Once again, the AARP is offering their Tax Aide program for 2023, which offers low- and middle-income people free tax services, with a focus on aiding seniors. COVID UPDATE

Well, this is something! The national emergency and public health emergency that were declared in 2020 are set to expire May 11. As Marin Public Health Officer Dr. Matt Willis explains in the video below, this marks a transition to the government approaching COVID more like other communicable diseases. Marin Public Health has said it plans to maintain focus on the most vulnerable communities, including long-term care facilities, the uninsured, and the homeless. One significant change we will all notice: the federal and state programs that governed free vaccines and at-home COVID tests will sunset in May. So get updated on your COVID vaccine and use this link (https://www.covid.gov/tests) to order free at-home tests while the program lasts.

Importantly, the *New York Times* is reporting that in January, the number of COVID-related deaths fell after a holiday spike but nevertheless numbered about 2,100 among those ages 65 to 74, more than 3,500 among 75- to 84-year-olds and nearly 5,000 among those over 85. Those three groups accounted for about 90 percent of the nation's COVID deaths last month. Masking is still effective in protecting against COVID, the flu, and other illnesses. The Cold Millions, by Jess Walter

Although set in the early 20th century in the midst of labor wars, women's suffrage, and the growth of the West, Jess Walter's story feels strangely familiar—many of its conflicts are ones that continue today. Two brothers, Gig and Rye, make their way around the western states looking for work, hopping trains, and avoiding police. Gig, the older, joins the labor movement, while Rye just wants to make a living to maybe buy some land and build a house one day. Gig's idealism and Rye's pragmatism put them at odds, but regardless of what happens, their bond keeps them showing up for the other. Circling around their story: the story of Spokane, Washington as it grows from backwater to boom town; the fiery Elizabeth Gurley Flynn (co-founder of the ACLU and champion of women's rights); the chasm between rich and poor; and the settling of the West and exploitation of its natural resources. A book that has the potential to be heavy and painful somehow manages to be tough but enlightening and hopeful. *Danielle, Marin Villages staff*


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
Block Party, PBS
