# Keep your mask handy and get boosted again!

Marin's high level of vaccinations has helped residents here avoid infections and also helped reduce the severity of illness in those who do get infected. Because immunity from infection does wear off, do keep in mind that Marin's Public Health officials strongly encourage everyone over 65 to get another bivalent booster. These boosters are widely available in Marin so please do consider making an appointment for one for yourself, and the sooner the better! And, keep a supply of masks handy. Although almost no one seems to be wearing them anymore, you may find yourself in a situation where you wish you had one—for example, if sitting next to someone in a crowded non-well-ventilated room, or next to someone who is coughing or sneezing. Wearing masks in grocery stores or other indoor spaces with lots of people when you just can't be "socially distant" from folks can also help protect you not only from COVID, but from pesky summer colds.

## Who was Yankee Doodle Dandy?



But, seriously, can you hum the Yankee Doodle song?

Yankee Doodle went to town, a-riding on a pony, stuck a feather in his cap, and called it macaroni!

Yankee Doodle keep it up, Yankee Doodle Dandy, mind the music and the step and with the girls be handy.

...and on and on for at least 120 verses and multiple versions that adapt the words to suit the situation. It's one of the most played tunes around the 4<sup>th</sup> of July, often played by Fife and Drum bands as they march in parades.

The actual origins of this song aren't entirely clear, but by the time of the French and Indian War and the later American Revolution, it seems to have been used by the British as a way to make fun of the ragtag American colonists they were fighting with or against, depending on the war. But those same colonists appropriated it and turned it on its head, so to speak, making it an expression of colonial pride and patriotism as they defeated the British in the American Revolution. Here's the scoop, according to the Cliff Notes online notes about this song, which seem to generally agree with other accounts:

"In 1750s England, *Yankee* was a general term of contempt. *Doodle* refers to a lowly provincial person, while a *Dandy* is a meticulously well-dressed man. In the 1700s, *macaroni\** was an English dandy who affected foreign fashions and mannerisms.

"So, roughly translated, the song says, 'This country bumpkin came along on a pony — not a horse! — and thought that merely sticking a feather in his hat would turn him into a suave sophisticate like a European. What a rube!'

"Despite the mocking tone, New England colonists turned the song into their rallying theme song during the Revolutionary War. They sang it proudly in the battles against the British...and with extra exuberance when Lord Cornwallis surrendered to George Washington at Yorktown in 1781."

\*Macaroni according to some refers to a particularly fancy wig that people excessively concerned with appearance wore, so the put-down is someone thinking putting a feather in his cap would equate to wearing a macaroni. (<a href="https://americansongwriter.com/meaning-of-yankee-doodle-song-lyrics/">https://americansongwriter.com/meaning-of-yankee-doodle-song-lyrics/</a>) Some others say it refers to a hat worn by Oliver Cromwell decorated with a single feather fastened by an elaborate knot—an Italian decoration called a "macaroni." Different tales abound, often told with absolute certainty, but with little proof.

How about some 4<sup>th</sup> of July jokes to share with your grandkids?


How come there aren't any knock-knock jokes about America? Because freedom rings!

And maybe one for us to remember:


