Digital Access for All program

Marin Center for Independent Living (CIL) is working to expand access to technology and online skills training for people with disabilities and seniors. To that end, they are giving 130 Chromebooks to qualified members of the community. This includes Marin residents over 60 or living with a disability whose income is within 300% of the Federal Poverty Level (\$43,740 for a household of one or \$59,160 for a household of two). Check in with your loved ones using the Snug app!



There is a new, free app called Snug that checks in with you at a set time every day and let's your emergency contacts know if they need to try to reach you. Here's how it works: 1) download the free Snug app, 2) add your emergency contacts, 3) select your daily check-in time. Snug will check in with you every day. Just tap the green button to confirm you're okay. If you miss your check in, Snug will alert your emergency contacts to make sure someone checks on you. Snug is available in the App Store for Apple devices and the Google Play store for Android devices.

COVID UPDATE

Not much is changing these days—COVID is still with us and it's still a good idea to **get the bivalent booster** if you are not up-to-date on your COVID boosters. It's vaccines that have kept Marin County's

numbers lowest in the country for hospitalizations and deaths! Once you get the booster, you can enjoy summer activities with confidence, masking up if you are in a crowd or feel more comfortable when close to others. In the fall, we'll have to look ahead to more time indoors and more viral spread. BOOKS, MOVIES, OR TV WE CAN'T STOP THINKING ABOUT Books



Once Upon a Tome, Oliver Darkshire

Unlike the name suggests, this is just a short read, but highly enjoyable nonetheless. A memoir of a young antiquarian bookseller in London, it takes us from his unlikely decision to apply for the job (and the even less likely result of his being hired) through his early years in this venerable profession. There are "weird and wonderful clientele, suspicious cupboards, unlabeled keys, poisoned books, and some things that aren't even books, presided over by one deeply eccentric apprentice," according to publisher W. W. Norton. His employer, Sotheran's, was founded in 1761, and business practices and the employees have not always kept up with the times. The cast of characters in this book would easily be out of a novel if we didn't know they were real humans. Oliver Darkshire's experiences and humor open a creaky door onto the world-unto-itself of antiquarian books and the people who sell them. I was reminded of this 2019 documentary recently, and of course, with the magic of streaming and the Internet, it is still easily accessed. A young couple (the husband, a filmmaker, documented the process and directed the movie) promise they will move out of Los Angeles and live on, and off, the land—totally in harmony with nature. They buy an abandoned farm with depleted, barren soil, and slowly but surely over seven years bring it back to a completely biodynamic, organic, working farm. The path there is not that easy, however, and some of the setbacks seem potentially devastating. In consulting with experts and bringing in animals of all stripes, they overcome many of the obstacles and learn to live with the ones that can't be 'fixed.'
