Catch-a-Ride pilot program offers discounted rides

The Marin Access Catch-A-Ride Pilot Program offers eligible riders up to thirty discounted rides per quarter (three-month period) using paper or digital vouchers. To be eligible for Catch-A-Ride you must be enrolled in Marin Access (transportation for seniors and disabled residents of Marin) and be 65+ and a resident of Marin County. The rides are via Uber and taxis, and there is no upfront cost, though there can be a \$5 base fare cost unless you are eligible for the Marin Access Fare Assistance (MAFA) program by income. COVID UPDATE

Covid, flu, and RSV numbers are rising in Marin

As we start to spend more time indoors, we are all more vulnerable to viruses, including flu, Covid, and RSV. In fact, the most recent Marin County wastewater tests show that RSV is coming on strong as of the last two weeks, yet only 8% of residents over 60 have gotten the vaccine. Covid levels in Marin have gone from low to medium this week. With cases of these three viruses expected to rise in the coming months, getting vaccines now is even more important. Marin County Public Health is partnering with Safeway and Marin Community Clinics to increase access to flu, Covid, and RSV

vaccines. Please note that this particular vaccine service is not available to Kaiser members—please contact Kaiser directly if you are a member to get details on receiving these vaccines. To find a vaccine clinic and/or make an appointment, please use this link.

Technology For Life

With most communication and business transacted on digital devices, familiarity with your phone is more important than ever. Technology For Life has developed *Virtual Instruction for Technology And Digital Literacy* or VITAL to help people learn the ins and outs of their iPhones. The VITAL program consists of a series of short instructional videos to watch and follow along at your own pace. Each video introduces you to the core functions of your iPhone. If you have an iPhone, consider joining this beta-testing period for VITAL. You will receive a loaner iPad that is preloaded with the VITAL app. You can watch the videos while you are practicing on your iPhone, pause, go back and rewatch, and practice as many times as you like. We estimate it will take about a week to get through all of the videos, and you can keep the loaner iPad for up to two weeks. 


BOOKS, MOVIES, OR TV WE CAN'T STOP THINKING ABOUT Books

Beckham, Netflix


