San Rafael Village 5th Anniversary Celebration and Recognition of our Amazing and Dedicated Volunteers

San Rafael Village (SRV) celebrated the 5th anniversary of its founding on August 28th with a festive, entertaining and upbeat party at the McInnis Golf Club restaurant. The room was bursting with energy. Balloons floated on white tablecloth-covered tables and an outstanding buffet offered a wide array of tasty snacks, from stuffed mushrooms to meatballs and fresh veggies. Volunteer Program organizers, Chris Asimos and Patti McWilliams, outdid themselves with a program that combined history, quizzes and lots of laughter. SRV founding co-chairs, Jane Solomons and Carole Sherick, recapped our village's background – growing from its first coffee with 30 people five years ago to our current roster of over 150 members and volunteers. Over this time, our programs, activities and social events have mushroomed – as have our requests for service and support, now 5 times greater than when SRV started. San Rafael Villagers' Death Café Taking the Taboo of Death "Out of the Closet"

Over the past few months, the SRV Death Café has proved to be an incredibly popular and valuable event. The Death Café is truly offering a proactive tool for sharing attitudes on death (and their origin), ways of coping with loved ones in denial (and solutions), issues, legalities, and practices regarding assisted death, belief (or lack of) related to God and spirit, fears (and mechanisms to allay them), the practicalities of supporting loved ones dying, and embracing the practical aspects of close of life preparation for the participants.

Believers and non-believers in attendance have left feeling lighter, and grateful for the experience. Each participant has welcomed the issues and experience of the others, and laughter and commiseration keep the events remarkably lively.

Held at the gracious home of Rhea Wolkowitz and facilitated by Jackie Hewitt (with two decades of hospice grief and caregiving experience) the collective spirit of open sharing, problem solving, and revelation creates an animated and intimate two-hour session. The Death Café has become so popular that early sign-up is advised since space is limited. Flyers will continue to alert everyone to the next upcoming Death Café. This is a fantastic addition to our monthly SRV activities!

San Rafael / Novato Potluck Picnic in the Park

Visit to the "Floating White House"

In the White House of President Franklin Delano Roosevelt, each member of the household was given a code name by the Secret Service assigned to protect them. Who do you think got the code name "The Informer"?

If you were on the San Rafael Villagers' outing on October 11th, you'd have the answer. SR Villagers were treated to an entertaining and enlightened glimpse into the life of FDR during a tour of the USS Potomac, "the floating White House," the yacht he used during his presidency to meet with royal visitors, foreign dignitaries and cabinet members, as well as for his own relaxation.



The Potomac, now moored at Oakland's Jack London Square, is open to the public for tours and cruises. And Villagers who boarded it got to explore the vessel, learn its history and pick up some intriguing tid-bits about FDR's world. Who would have known that "The Informer" was the Secret Service's name for the President's dog Fala, whose potty breaks while traveling by train with the FDR often give away the President's whereabouts!

After the tour, Villagers enjoyed lunch at the nearby restaurant, Kincaid's, overlooking the harbor before returning home to Marin. "What a treat" was the assessment of a day well spent by intrepid Villagers.
